

## PE Spending Strategy Report 2022/23

### School Principles for PE and Sport Premium Grant Spend

- Children will benefit from high quality PE & Sport.
- Children have access to PE & Sport in a safe environment.
- Children access opportunities which increases a healthy and active lifestyle and improves emotional well-being.
- Children are exposed to a range of different sports to develop talents and skills.

The PE Spending Grant for 2022/23 is £19,630.

Children are demonstrating improved dance skills.	Dance lessons were observed by PE subject lead in Autumn Term. Imoves is being used to support staff knowledge and understanding. Children have showcased their dance to another year group.
